Monday last Capt. Calley arrived at Marblehead in 26 Days from FALMOUTH, by whom we are favoured with the following late Articles of Intelligence, viz.

LONDON, March 27.
YESTERDAY at 3 o'Clock the Lord Mayor, attended by Serjeant Glynn, Recorder, Alderman Burt, Mr. Sheriff Lewes, City Remembrancer, Common Serjeant, Town Clerk, eight of the Livery, and the rest of the City-Officers, went to St. James's, where the Recorder read to his Majesty the Address, Petition and Remonstrance from the City of London: To which his Majesty was pleased to give the following answer.

"I have the satisfaction to think that my people don't doubt of my readiness to attend to their complaints, or of my ardent desire to promote their happiness, which I cannot more effectually do, than by resisting every attempt to sow groundless jealousies among them.

"Your Petition is so void of foundation, and is besides conceived in such disrespectful terms, that I am convinced you do not seriously imagine it can be complied with."

The King was attended by a numerous Court, and seemed very cheerful; and before the Citizens were introduced to his Majesty, they were given to understand, that on such an occasion as the present, they were not to expect to kiss the King's hand.

Yesterday the Earl of Stormont took leave of his Majesty, and tomorrow will set out on his embassy to the court of France.

March 28. Letters from Paris say, that the court of Versailles only wait to receive some advices from the French Ambassador at Vienna, after which that Court will declare itself an enemy to the conduct of the three united Powers.

March 29. It is expected that Parliament will not rise, at noon, till the 20th of July, nor, if punishments or public censures take place, till the month of July.

The various alliances which is now almost concluded between England, France, & Spain, is universally allowed to be unnatural, and will certainly share the fate of all unnatural things: it is a monster, and cannot live long.

It is reported that the city Remonstrance is to be laid before a great Assembly.

The House of Commons, it is said, will prolong their Sessions till the middle of July, on account of the many affairs still remaining for their consideration.

March 30. The present conduct of the French Ambassador and Ministry, with respect to the balls, brings your recollection on the expression of the King of Great Britain: "We shall settle our state-affairs—but first we'll have a dance."

Two Couriers arrived this day from the Continent with some spirited Remonstrances to our Court.

As a fresh stroke to public credit, a very eminent banker stopped payment yesterday.

April 3. We hear that Sir John Dalrymple has lately discovered some curious manuscripts, in the ruins of Herculaneum, by which it appears, that the old Greek and Roman patriots, were traitors to their country.

We hear that the bug-bear which the King of Prussia holds up continually to deter our King from interfering with the plunders on the Continent is, the ruin of Hanover. If Great-Britain makes one offensive step to interrupt that Monarch's views in this scandalous affair, he threatens, as his first stroke, to pour swarms of troops into Hanover. It appears that these threats are sufficient, for it has been determined in the British cabinet, that the division of Poland can be in no degree injurious to the interest of Britain.

They write from Paris that the Court of France has openly declared, that, if any Prussian troops march into Swedish Pomerania, a numerous army shall immediately set out for Embden, Friesland, and other states belonging to Brandenburg.

We have the pleasure to inform the publick, that the Earl of Bellmont is perfectly recovered.

"Next Thursday at Eleven o'Clock a Sermon will be preached before the Convention of Ministers at the Old South Meeting-House in this Town: The public Services will be adapted for the Edification of Christians in general, and it would be very agreeable to the Ministers, to see many of God's People come and join them in their public Devotions; at the same Time there will be a Collection towards a perpetual Fund, the Annual Interest of which is to be applied for the Relief of the Widows and Orphan Children of Deceased Ministers in indigent and necessitous Circumstances.

The Charity of all good Christians is earnestly requested on this Occasion, and in no Case is public Charity more Useful and Necessary, as every one must see, who reflects on the very distressed Condition of the Families of many poor Ministers at their Decease; and that, while there are charitable Instructions for the Relief of the Widows and Children of Deceased Ministers of all Denominations in Great Britain and Ireland, those of this Province are left, in a Manner, wholly unprovided for, as their Distresses be ever so great."

Shall we behold such Excellence traduc'd?
The great, the wise, the brave, discreet Rapatio
Let us support, or order's at an end,
The bands of government are loos'd at once,
Confusion, rage, and riot, hand in hand,
With dire revenge, and anarchy, succeed.

These fright'ning bugbears, gender'd at Neponsett
Dealt out by Proteus, or a Crito's pen,
Cant push the virtue of this noble senate,

I'll hasten hence, I see the rising storm.

HONESTUS.

I from my soul detest these base designs,
Go tell thy master he deceives no more,
The cover'd sting, the half disguis'd plan,
Peeps through the veil, and shows the abject man,
Who for a place, a grasp of shining earth,
Has stab'd the vitals, that first gave him birth.
Shall Servia bleed, and shan't her sons complain,
While traitors revel o'er her children slain?
Go dirtiest dupe of all the venal race
Who sell their country for a pension'd place,
Who barter conscience for a gilded straw,
Riot on right, and trample on the law. *Exit.*

End of the second Act.

The Scene changes, discovers Proteus in his own Apartment, in a trembling Attitude.

PROTEUS solus.

I've shifted, trim'd and veer'd to either side,
As changing fortune smiled on either party,
'Till neither trusts, or can in me confide.
My future game shall be to fawn on Pow'r,
And gain a simile on which depends my fate.
I'll cringe and court each ministerial tool,
With zeal redoubled, I'll extol each measure,
So keep my seat when a mandamus comes,
Procur'd by serpentine manœuvres of one man,
To fort the sycophant, from men of worth.

The scene closes on Proteus.

After which several Tragical Scenes are exhibited, but we refer the curious to the whole Representation, as acted, at the Head Quarters of the Bashaw of Servia, and proceed to the 3d Act, which opens

SCENE I.

Drums, Trumpets and several warlike Instruments without—

A Battle ensues, in which Rapatio, his Abettors and Creatures are totally defeated, after which Freedom and Happiness are restored to the Inhabitants of Servia, by the prudent and spirited Conduct of Honestus, Hortensius, Cassius Rusticus—and others.

But as this Entertainment is crowded with a Variety of interesting Events, we shall omit any further Extracts at this Time, except the concluding Scene of the 4th Act, where the Curtain draws up, and presents Rapatio to the Audience in deep mourning.

Some Time last Week Ebenezer Richardson, Esq; who lately had such a fortunate and surprising Escape from the Gallows for the Murder of young SEIDER; through the extraordinary Clemency of our pious and gracious Monarch, set out for the City of Philadelphia, being appointed an Officer in the Customs, for his notable Exertions in Behalf of Government—Balf, McQuirk & Kennedys are not the only Instances of the unexampled Goodness of George the Third. At the General Election at Hartford on Thursday the 13th Instant, the Governor, Deputy Governor, and Assistants were chosen the same as last Year.

Last Saturday, being Peggy, the Cruiser lay at Fisher's Island point—a Brig bound to Boston with a Load of Metals, engaged her Attention, which she took out all her People but one, and more'd the Brig in the open Sound, at dead of Night, sent a Boat to the Collector's to know if she was not a good Prize, but being informed to the contrary, they returned the People on Board, after having stolen and carried away two Duffil Great-Coats, two pair Duffil Trowsers, one Frock, two pair Oznabrigs Trowsers, and three Pillow Cases, which they strip off the poor Seamen's Pillows. She then came into the Chops of this Harbour, when a poor Oysterman, with an old Boat not worth 10l. engaged her Attention; the Oysterman was order'd to strike on Pain of immediate D—n, with all the Train of "d—n'd Rascals, Scoundrels," &c. and to come along Side the Cruiser: The poor Man (having about 30 Bushels of Oysters, and his Boat, being all he was worth) obeyed; and after detaining him some Time, they took from him five Bushels of Oysters, and then dismiss'd him. On Sunday a Two-Mast Boat from New Haven enter'd the Harbour, when these Sons of War bro't her too: She was sail'd by two Boys, the oldest about 16, and had on board a Barrel of Currant Wine, which a Gentleman there had sent his Friend in this Town; they demand'd her Papers—the Boys knew not what they meant—But after repeated Execrations, in their usual Form, they tap'd the Wine, drew out about one Half, and then dismiss'd the Boat. On Tuesday, one Mr. Vail, a Man about 60 Years of Age, was coming into the Harbour in a Sloop from Long Island; they order'd him to bring two and let go his Anchor, which he did, but they thinking it not soon enough, fired several Shot at him, after his Anchor was gone;—he was order'd on board the Cruiser, where Capt. Howe reviled him in the most abusive way, and (as he had no Oysters or Currant Wine and did not produce any money) struck Mr. Vail in the Face with his Fist, which so provoked the old Man that he returned the Compliment into the Captains Muns, and placed his Honor's Head where his Heels should have been; when he rose, and had cleared his Joles of their own Claret, he order'd his Pistols to be brought; but on second Tho't, set his Bruiser to beat him, but he being a Man of more Honor than his Commander, refused, and Mr. Vail was returned to his Boat, with Liberty to proceed; she being only in Ballast.

Thus, America, is thy Parent Britain, with the Expence of Millions, now shewing to you her Splendour and Affection, that we may conceive some Idea of her Majesty and Greatness, so as not to contend for our inestimable Privileges; for this is to shew what we are to suffer if we attempt it! And thus by the greatest Mismanagement, are the Bulwarks of the English Nation, which in the Year 1759, gave Laws to the World, now made the pest of Society—her brave Officers discarded, and the most vicious, pitiful cowardly Scoundrels put in their place.

We hear that the Hon. Daniel Horsmanden and the Hon. Frederick Smyth, Esqrs; have engaged a Passage for this place with Capt. Freebody, next trips in order to join the rest of the Commissioners, to make further inquiry into the GASPEE AFFAIR.

Last Friday night, arrived here the Swan sloop of war, Capt. James Ayscough, from Boston. Last week the Cruiser sloop of war returned from a Cruise up the sound, without any prize.

What a pity it is, that a certain class of mankind can't find better employ, than that of FRYING on the industrious part of their fellow-creatures!!!

Last Friday Afternoon, his Excellency the Governor, with the Hon. General Brattle, and the Hon. John Hancock, Esq; two of the Commissioners on behalf of this Province for settling the Line between this Government and New-York, returned hither from the Congress at Hartford; having, after divers Conferences there with the Commissioners from New-York, unanimously agreed that the following Line should be the Boundary between the two Provinces, viz. "A Line beginning at a Place fixed upon by the two Governments of New-York and Connecticut in or about the Year of our Lord 1737, for the North West Corner of a Tract of Land commonly called the Oolong or Equivalent Land, and running from the said Corner North Twenty one Degrees ten Minutes and thirty Seconds East, as the Magnetic Needle now Points, to the North Line of the Massachusetts-Bay, shall at all Times hereafter be the Line of Jurisdiction between the said Province of the Massachusetts-Bay and the said Province of New-York in all and every Part and Place where the said Province of New-York on its Eastern Boundary shall join on the said Province of Massachusetts-Bay."—The above Agreement was signed, sealed, and sealed by all the Commissioners the 18th of this May Instant, as also by the two Governors, so that it is hoped those Animosity which have been productive of much Mischiefs in Time past, will now cease.—The King's Flag is still necessary.

Wednesday last the Rev'd JOSHUA HOW, M. A. late a Tutor of Yale College in Connecticut, was ordained to the Pastoral Office over the Church and Congregation at the New-South Meeting-House in this Town; The Solemnity was introduced by an Anthem: The Rev. Dr. Pemberton of this Town began with Prayer: The Rev. President Dagget of Yale-Yollege preached a Sermon well adapted to the Occasion from those Words in 2 Cor. 1. 12. The Rev. Dr. Chauncy Prayed previous to the Charge: The Rev. Mr. Aaron Brown of Killingley, Father in Law to Mr. How, gave the Charge: The Rev. Mr. Whittlesey of New-Haven Prayed; and the Rev. Dr. Chauncy gave the Right Hand of Fellowship. The whole concluded with another Anthem.

The Ship Hayley, Capt. James Scott, sail'd last Tuesday for London: In said Ship went Passengers Capt. Grey of the 57th Regiment, and his Family. And, On Friday Morning the Brig Dolphin, Capt. James Scott, sail'd for the same Port.

By a Vessel arrived last Week from Baltimore, in Maryland, we are informed, That a few Days before they sail'd, a couple of infamous Informers were taken up about five o'Clock, P. M. Tarr'd and Feather'd, and Carried about the Town 'till Night, for Informing against a Brig and a Sloop, and then order'd to depart the Town in 24 Hours. We hear they were genteely disciplin'd at almost every Part of the Town, and that they d—n'd those who were the Cause of their just Treatment.—The next Day it being reported they had return'd, diligent Search was made after them but to no Effect; and 'twas reported that they had set out for the supposed Receipts for such Vagrants viz. BOSTON, where, no Doubt, from the peccific Disposition of the Inhabitants they will find an Asylum of Security.

We also hear, That the same Day a Negro was executed there, for striking his Master, and that the Executioner was a Person under Sentence of Death.

An Impartial view, of a Narrative of the Principal Circumstances relative to the Rev. Mr. Wesley's late Conference, held at Bristol, August the 6th 1772, &c. with the Declaration then agreed to by Mr. Wesley, and Fifty Three of his Preachers.

By the Rev. Mr. SHIRLEY. In which the Reader is presented with the Minutes of the Conference, the preceding Year, which gave great Offence, as containing Justification by Works, and overturning the Gospel of Christ; Lady Huntingdon's, and Mr. Shirley's Letters to Mr. Wesley, on the Occasion:—And the Declaration which satisfied the Objectors.

The Author's chief Design is to shew, That this famous Declaration, declares nothing in Favour of justification by Faith only, but is perfectly consistent with justification and Salvation by Works.—That Mr. Wesley, never intended it as a Recantation of the offensive Minutes; and consequently, that the Joy that hath been occasioned by it, and Mr. Shirley's Narrative, on the other Side of the Water, hath been only rejoicing in a Thing of Nought.
