NEW-YORK, March 10.

Tuesday afternoon arrived, in 6 weeks and 5 days, from Falmouth, the Mercury Packet-Boat, Captain Dillon, by whom we have the following Advices.

**LONDON.**

Jan. 11. It is said, that the French King is in a state of mind very little removed from idiocy or insensibility, so much, that neither the charms of his favorite's conversation, nor the pleasures of the chase, are capable of rousing him. This, it is said, has caused several cabals, and given birth to a spirit of intrigue extremely alarming to the ministers and the minister.

It is now generally believed that the Parliament will not be dissolved till March twelvemonth.

Extract of a Letter from Warsaw, Dec. 15

**WE** have just now received a full and authentic confirmation of the great and important victory gained by the Russian army on the other side the Danube, over the army of the Grand Vizir on the 16th ult. The whole Turkish grand army being defeated, the Russians made themselves masters of all the Turkish artillery, baggages, and military chest, to an immense value. The Grand Vizir was missing, and it was reported, and generally believed (when the courier who brought the intelligence from the army came away) that he is among the number of the dead. The Russians were still in pursuit of the enemy; and the rest of the Russian army who were yet on this side of the Danube, have received orders to pass the river, and give the last blow to the enemy. The garrison at Silistria are at present left to themselves, without the least hope of receiving succour from the Turkish army; nor are the fugitive Turks able to fly into that fortress, as all the passes are cut off by the Turks, which give the Russians great hopes of being masters of that important fortress very soon, which will open the passage to Adrianople; so that there is the greatest reason to hope, that the present winter campaign will finish the struggle, before the Turks are able to compose themselves; and in all probability, the Porte will be obliged to comply with the terms of peace proposed by Russia in the late congress, before the expiration of another month, unless some Christian power (as is expected) should throw off the mask, and publicly declare themselves for the Porte; against which event not less than half a million of Austrian and Prussian troops are in readiness."

**Proceedings of the Town of HINGHAM.**

At a legal Town-Meeting held at Hingham, on the 31st Day of January, A. D. 1774, the Town appointed a Committee to take into Consideration a Letter sent to them by the Committee of Correspondence of the Town of Boston; as also a Number of Papers inclos'd, and Report to the Town at the Adjournment; and then the Meeting was adjourned to the Annual Meeting in March next. The Town being met according to Adjournment, their Committee Reported as follows, viz.

**WHEN** we call to mind a late Act of the British Parliament, expressly declaring, That the King, Lords and Commons, in Parliament assembled, "have, ever had, and of Right ought to have full Power and Authority to make Laws and Statutes of sufficient force and validity to bind the Colonies and People of America, subject to the Crown of Great-Britain, in all Cases whatever": And in Consequence thereof an Act of Parliament made for the express Purpose of raising a Revenue in America, for defraying the Charge of the Administration of Justice, &c. in the Colonies. And when we also consider that the more effectually to carry into execution the same Act, the Councils of the Nation, in a late Session of the British Parliament, have empowered the East-India Company to export their Teas into America,

free of all Duties in England, but still liable to a Duty on its being landed in the Colonies. And comparing those Acts and others similar to them, with several Clauses in the Charter granted to this Province, by their late Majesties King William and Queen Mary of blessed Memory; in which it is among other Things established and ordained, that "all and every of the Subjects of us, our Heirs and Successors, which shall go to Inhabit in our said Province and Territory, and every of their Children which shall happen to be born there, or on the Seas in going thither, or returning from thence, shall have and enjoy, all Liberties and Immunities of free and natural born Subjects within any of the Dominions of us, our Heirs and Successors, TO ALL INTENTS, CONSTRUCTIONS AND PURPOSES WHATSOEVER, as if they and every of them were born within this our Realm of England." And whereas by the said Royal Charter it is also especially ordained, that the GREAT AND GENERAL COURT OR ASSEMBLY therein constituted, shall have full Power and Authority to impose Rates and Taxes, upon the Estates and Persons of all and every of the Proprietors and Inhabitants of the said Province and Territory, for the service of the King, in the necessary defence and support of his Government in the Province, and protection and preservation of his Subjects therein.

The Design and Tendency of the said Acts of Parliament appear in too conspicuous a point of Light to need any comment: And are too alarming to admit of silence, since silence might be construed into Acquiescence. — We therefore Resolve,

[Then follow a Number of Resolves in the Words of those enter'd into by the Citizens of Philadelphia before publish'd in this Paper, to which is added, viz.]

Resolved, That it affords the greatest satisfaction the Inhabitants of this Town, to find that his Majesty's Subjects of the American Colonies and of this Province in particular, are so thoroughly awakened to a sense of their Danger arising from Incroachments made on their Constitutional Rights and Liberties, and that so firm a union is established among them. And that we will be ever ready to join our fellow Subjects in all laudable Measures for the Redress of the many Grievances we labor under.

The said Report having been several Times read; upon a Motion made, the Question was put, whether the same be Accepted, and be Recorded in the Town's Book of Records, and a Copy thereof sent by the Town-Clerk to the Committee of Correspondence of the Town of Boston, and passed in the Affirmative.

**DIED.** Mrs. Ann Pierpont, aged 45, Wife of Mr. Robert Pierpont.

At Salem, the Hon. Nathaniel Ropes, Esq; one of the Justices of the Superior Court, Court of Assize, &c. for this Province.

Last Monday arrived in this Town, Mr. WILLIAM GODDARD, Printer in Philadelphia and Baltimore.—The cause of that Gentleman's tour is interesting to all the Colonies, and we are happy to find that all through which he has come are so thoroughly engaged in it. Every Colony to the Southward of us, manifest their readiness to come into the measure, provided we adopt it, and we are informed there is not the shadow of a doubt of its being as warmly patronized here as any where. How cheerfully will every well wisher to his Country lay hold of an opportunity to risque the channel of public and private intelligence out of the hands of a power openly inimical to its Rights and Liberties. Several Meetings have already been held on the interesting subject, and on the Morrow Evening it is hoped to be concluded so far that Mr. Goddard may proceed Eastward, with a moral certainty of carrying his point throughout the Colonies.

**SIR,**

I have heard that in circles where you depend upon your influence, you are very industrious in starting objections against the propriety and feasibility of Mr. \_\_\_\_\_'s scheme of establishing a constitutional Post Office. The objections I have heard are the following, viz. That at present the office can but barely support itself, and affords no revenue: 2. That the establishment of Post-masters and Riders in the manner proposed will

render the public uncertain of the monies, bills, &c. committed to their care: 3. That in case such an office should be set up, the keeper of it may expect to be prosecuted at the suit of the Postmaster General, and tho' no damages be found by a jury on this side the water, yet the matter in debate being above three hundred sterl. an appeal will lie to the King in council, who will undoubtedly award the appellant the sum he suffers with costs of prosecution. The other trifling consideration of its being an improper time, while we have already so much business on hand, and this manœuvre being owing to a private pique between Mr. \_\_\_\_\_ and the P—M—G. may be taken up hereafter, should any one appear to urge them in earnest.

1. To the first head I answer, that I can hardly conceive the other riders to run the office in debt, while Mr. Silent Wilde, Mr. William Williams, and a rider between Hartford and Nine Partners, maintain themselves. The profits along the sea coast must be tenfold.

2. To the second I answer that both masters and riders will, on the present plan, be under the controul of a committee of the subscribers throughout the continent, and can be displaced by them in case of unfaithfulness, which is more than we can promise ourselves in the present state of things.

3. Respecting prosecution, and appeal; this in my opinion is a meer bugbear. The Postmaster's damages must lie for intrusion, upon an estate which he lawfully holds. All Europe and America know he can hold no such estate in the colonies without the consent of their parliaments; new offices with new fees, or even the augmentation of fees to old offices being in such case void and contrary to Magna Charta. No jury can therefore find damages where they find no estate: No court can give judgment or sentence contrary to the verdict of a jury: If no judgment therefore can be made up on damages found, there can be no judgment to appeal from. This reasoning must appear to every one so incontestible that to offer any thing further in support of so plain a case would imply a question of the good sense of my countrymen.

**HORTENSIVS.**

At the same Time Mr. Goddard's Plan of establishing an American Post-Office by Subscription, meets with the greatest Encouragement imaginable in this Metropolis, we are informed the Patriotic Doctor Franklin is severely threatened with the loss of that Place under the British Minister. Should such a thing really take Place it would multiply the Satisfaction of every Friend to this Country in disappointing the Revenge of that inveterate Enemy to the Rights of America. Many of the Patrons of this new Scheme were much concerned lest it should appear ungrateful to Doctor Franklin, especially at a Period when he has given such signal Proof of faithfulness to his Trust, in obtaining and sending over the treasonable Letters of Hutchinson, Oliver, &c. But perhaps the new Post-Office may be beneficial and more agreeable to the Doctor than ever was the old one.

The Superior Court for the County of Middlesex, which was to have been held at Charlestown on the second Tuesday of April next, is, by a late Act, appointed to be held there on the first Tuesday of April annually.

Capt. Silas Atkins, jun. arrived here on Thursday last, informs us, that on Saturday the 6th Instant, in Lat. 36: 37 Long. 70: 38 West, he spoke with the Brig Barbados Packet, William Hawkins, Master, bound from Philadelphia for Barbados, who the Day before lost his Foremast and Bowprit, having had very bad Weather, and was putting back for Philadelphia in order to rest.

Capt. Maccarty is arrived at Barbados from the Coast of Africa.

We hear from Nantucket, that on Wednesday the 9th of March Instant, at about 8 o'clock in the Morning, they had the most violent Gust of Wind that perhaps was ever known there, but it lasted only about a Minute, it seem'd to come in a narrow Vein, and in its progress blew down and totally destroyed the Light-House on that Island, besides several Shops, Barns, &c. the Gust continued fifteen Minutes it's thought it would not have left more than one half the Buildings standing, in the Course that it passed, but we don't hear of any Persons receiving much hurt, nor much Damage done, except the loss of the Light-House which in every respect is considerable.

Thursday Night last a Number of Prisoners set Fire to the Goal in this Town, and had it got a little more Head before it was discovered, it would have entirely consumed the same.—This is the fourth Time the Goal Watch have prevail'd the same.

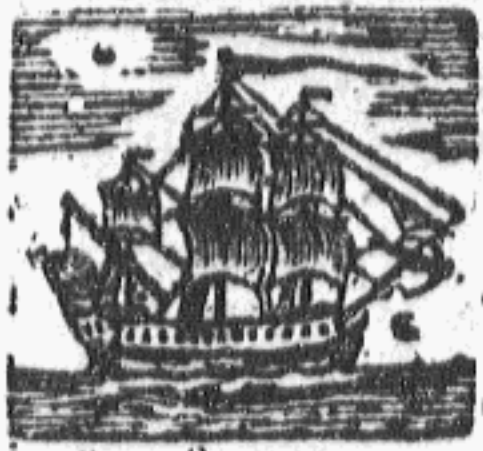
